Chairman's Statement

The Trustees have pleasure in presenting their 12th Annual Report on our work in and with China.

2008 has been an epochal year. In China it was the year of the Sichuan earthquake in May, and of the Beijing Olympics in August. Around the world it will be remembered as the year of the financial earthquake; and for a charity based in England, while our currency and stock markets and interest rates were falling, it has been challenging. These events did not prevent us from continuing our work in China, with increased activity, in response to the needs of our Chinese friends.

When we heard about the earthquake in May, we quickly discussed how we could help those affected, especially the young. We were anxious that, as with all our work in China, our funds could reach those in need without administrative deductions, and with confidence in the integrity of their distribution. We were fortunate in having a long relationship with the Chengdu Gay Care Organisation (CGCO) and its leader Wang Xiaodong, and indeed 3 years previously they had taken us on a visit to Dujiangyan, one of the epicentres of the earthquake. The CGCO responded with enthusiasm to our suggestion that they use our money for the earthquake victims, especially for schoolchildren, at a time when many schools had calamitously collapsed upon their pupils. They liaised with the CDC's (Centres for Disease Control) in Chengdu and Dujiangyan, and brought medical supplies and clothing and books and study materials to the children, and at the same time helped the CDC to take care of HIV-affected people in that region.

We consider the CGCO to be one of the best – and most transparent – of the gay groups around China. Some 500 gay groups are now registered with local governments around China, resulting in greatly improved outreach to the group where HIV is spreading most rapidly in China. We have followed our earthquake cooperation with the CGCO by establishing a new relationship with the Chengdu Contagious Diseases Hospital, which handles the largest number of Aids cases in Sichuan – and most recently handling the first cases of swine flu in that large and populous province. The CGCO introduced us to this hospital, whose clinical work greatly impressed us, and we are now contributing to this, with excellent results in the first few months.

Sichuan, especially Chongqing and Chengdu, has now become one of the 3 provinces around China where we are most active. The others are Xinjiang and the far northwest and Yunnan and the southwest. We paid our fifth visit to Urumqi and Yining City in Xinjiang in November. This is one of the poorest and most vulnerable provinces, especially among the Muslim Uighur people and other minorities such as the Kazakhs, the Tajiks and the Hui. We are giving our largest support to the Xinjiang Infectious Diseases Hospital in Urumqi, which is handling more HIV in-patients than any other hospital in China. We also help their out-patients, and we finance a website in the Uighur language. We are also supporting the Yining City Hospital in Yili Prefecture, where there is the largest concentration of Aids patients in the province. We recently invited 2 doctors from Urumqi for training at the Chelsea & Westminster and St. Mary's Hospitals in London.

Our longstanding work in the southwest continues actively, especially at the Peggy Health Centre in Dali, whose Aids work under Dr. Zhang Jianbo is regarded by the health authorities in Beijing to be the most outstanding in the whole of China. We continue to cooperate with the CDC in Simao in the far south of Yunnan, including the southernmost counties of Menglian and Lancang. We have also resumed our work with Voluntary Service Overseas (VSO) in Nujiang prefecture and in the Home Aids project around Kunming.

Our annual Barry & Martin's Prize is the most recognised award in the Aids field in China, and is described by the health authorities in Beijing as "extremely useful". Our object each year is to draw attention to excellence in different aspects of Aids treatment and care, in different parts of China. We like to bestow our prize where it has been earned, and the publicity generated locally sets an example of good practice around China.

We gave our 9th annual prize in 2008, and we felt that it was appropriate to give it to 2 HIV-positive gay men, who were "out" about their sexuality as well as their infection. This is not easy anywhere in the world, and in China there is still much social stigma on homosexuality, and fear about those infected by HIV. We therefore gave our prize to 2 courageous men, Meng Lin of the Ark of Love in Beijing and Murong Feng, of the Hebei Light of Love in Baoding, Hebei. They have devoted all their time to helping HIV-positive people all over China and to educating those at risk.

There can be no doubt about the concern of the Chinese government to tackle HIV/Aids in general, and to access the gay community at a time when the infection is rampant among gay people. The Ministry of Health and the National CDC demonstrated this by cooperating with Dr. Zhang Beichuan and our Trust in giving a 3-day seminar on homosexuality in Beijing in November. Our Embassy showed special support, with Barbara Woodward, Minister and Acting Ambassador, coming to speak movingly (in fluent Mandarin) about the UK experience with homosexuality and HIV. The Ford Foundation and our Trust were asked to compose the first morning of the seminar, with (a) a ceremony to mark the 10th anniversary of Friends Exchange, the magazine for the gay community published by Dr. Zhang Beichuan, which Ford Foundation has financed throughout, and (b) Barry & Martin's prizegiving.

A happy development over the last year has been the Quiet Garden project at Beijing You'an Hospital, an initiative of Nursing Professor Fu Yan, with detailed support from the hospital's top management. The Quiet Garden is a facility which looks after newly-infected HIV-positive people, especially the fast-increasing numbers of infected gays. This project was initially funded by our Trust, and has established itself as a model to be developed in other cities. This gives sympathy and comfort, and confidentiality, to the newly-infected, and the assurance of the best treatment currently available in China. It is our hope that a wider range of HIV medicines will become available, and more affordable, in the near future.

Having got through such a critical year as 2008, we feel a little more confident about 2009 and beyond, in the light of the friendship and trust shown to us by medical officials around China, and by the patients themselves. It has been a great help to us to have Eugene Chang as our Trustee resident in Beijing, with Jet Liu also there as China Liaison Officer. We continue to enjoy excellent cooperation with the hospitals in London, Oxford and Edinburgh; and both Professor Clifford Leen of Western General in Edinburgh and Dr. Alan Smith of St. Mary's Paddington have been with us on visits to China during the past year; and the UK hospitals have been welcoming doctors from China whose visits to our country we have sponsored, most recently from the Ditan Hospital in Beijing and the Xinjiang Infectious Diseases Hospital in Urumqi.

We continue to enjoy the counsel and company of Liz Shields on our visits to China, and the financial support of the Trust which commemorates her mother, The Mary Kinross Charitable Trust. Dr. Shisong Jiang continues to act as our hardworking bridge between the UK and China. Our Trustee (and my niece) Nathalie has been appointed our Clerk and taken over our day-to-day financial administration, and her house has become our registered office, while Ires Lock continues her work as our Secretary. We hope that our current arrangements can demonstrate an effective, transparent and economical structure to our friends and supporters.

The Trustees cannot sufficiently thank our friends who have continued with their donations, without the slightest interruption, throughout the financial whirlwind, so that we have been able to maintain and increase our activities in China. I would make special mention here of our friends Daniel and Sally Zhou in Beijing, who have financed our group's domestic travel within China; and Goldman Sachs Asia for their enthusiastic participation in our work.



贝利马丁基金会主席报告

董事会在此呈报我们关于中国方面工作的第十二个年度报告。

2008年是不同寻常的一年。在这一年，中国5月份发生四川地震，8月份北京举办奥林匹克运动会。而在世界范围内这一年发生了金融地震。作为一个基于英格兰的慈善机构，虽然我们面临着货币市场、股票市场和利率下跌的挑战，但这并不能阻止我们继续进行我们在中国的工作。为了满足中国朋友的需求，我们的活动反而增加了。

在5月份得知地震的噩耗时，我们迅速讨论如何帮助那些地震受害者，尤其是青少年。我们希望象我们在中国的其他工作一样，将资金直接送达急需的人以避免引起管理费用。我们也需要找到具有诚信的机构合作。幸运的是，我们与成都同乐健康咨询服务中心(CGCO)交往深厚。三年前，其领导人王晓东曾带领我们参观了都江堰，这次地震的震中之一。同乐小组热烈响应我们的提议，同意将资金用于地震受害者，特别是那些因校舍坍塌而受到影响的孩子们。同乐小组与成都和都江堰的疾控中心一起，给孩子们带去医疗用品、衣物和书籍，同时帮助疾控中心照顾当地受HIV困扰的人们。

我们认为同乐是中国同志小组中最好而且最透明的组织之一。同志人群是中国HIV传播最为迅速的群体。国内大约有500个同志小组已在各地方政府注册，这极大地改善了对HIV群体的外展服务。在抗震救灾与同乐小组的合作后，我们继续和他们合作，一起与成都市传染病医院建立了新的良好关系。这家医院是四川省收治艾滋病例数最多的医院，最近在这一地广人多的省份又收治了中国第一例甲型H1N1流感病人。同乐小组把我们介绍给这家医院，医院的临床工作给我们留下了深刻的印象。我们已开始与该院合作，在最初数月已取得了良好的成绩。

四川，尤其是重庆和成都，是我们在中国最积极开展活动的3个省份之一。其它地区包括新疆为代表的西北地区，及云南为代表的西南地区。在11月份，我们第五次访问了新疆的乌鲁木齐市和伊宁市，新疆是一个较为贫困和弱势的省份，尤其是穆斯林维吾尔族和其他少数民族如哈萨克族、塔吉克族和回族社区更为突出。我们向位于乌鲁木齐的新疆传染病医院投入了最大的支持，这里是中国收治艾滋病住院病人最多的医院。我们也向医院的门诊病人提供帮助，并向该院的维吾尔语网站提供经济支持。我们也向伊利地区的伊宁市人民医院提供支持，这一地区是该省艾滋病患者密度最高的地区。我们还邀请了乌鲁木齐两位医生到伦敦的晨曦医院和圣玛丽医院培训。

我们在西南地区长期以来开展的工作依然保持活跃，尤其是大理佩吉健康中心，张建波医生主持的艾滋病工作被国家卫生部门认为是全中国最杰出的。我们继续与云南南部地区思茅（疾控中心）合作，包括最南部边陲地区孟连和澜沧县。我们也恢复了与英国海外志愿服务社（VSO）合作，资助他们在云南怒江地区艾滋病项目和昆明爱资家的组织。

我们每年颁发的贝利马丁奖是中国艾滋病领域中最为知名的奖项，中国政府的卫生官认为“极其有用”。我们颁奖的目的是引起人们对不同地区，不同领域，对艾滋病治疗与关怀作出杰出贡献的精英人士的注意。我们会到得奖人的所在地区颁奖，意在当地取得宣传效应。这样，得奖人及其良好经验和做法能为全中国树立良好的榜样。

2008年颁发了第9届年度奖项，我们认为把这个奖项颁发给两个HIV阳性的“同志”十分合适，他们已经对其性取向和病情公开了身份。在世界上任何地方做到这一点都是不容易的。在中国对于同性恋的社会歧视和对于HIV感染者的恐惧仍然相当严重。因此，我们把第九届年度奖颁发给两个勇敢的男性—北京爱之方舟的孟林和保定河北爱之光小枫，他们投入全部时间和精力帮助中国的HIV阳性患者，并对高危人群开展教育。

毫无疑问，中国政府十分关注处理HIV/AIDS问题，当艾滋病在“同志人群”迅速扩展时，也十分关注“同志社区”的工作。因此，卫生部和国家疾控中心与张北川博士和我们基金会合作于去年11月在北京召开了关于同性恋的为期3天的研讨会。英国大使馆也给予特殊的支持，英国驻华大使馆吴百纳公使/代理大使以流利的中文热情介绍了英国在同性恋和HIV方面的经验。福特基金会和我们基金会应邀筹备研讨会第一天上午的发言，并参加了张北川博士主办的，由福特基金会一直赞助的关于同志社区《朋友》杂志10周年纪念庆典，以及贝利马丁奖的颁奖大会。


在过去的一年中，一个令人欣慰的进展就是北京佑安医院的“恬园项目”。这一项目由福燕护士长创办的，得到医院上层管理部门的详细规划和支持。恬园是一个照顾HIV新感染者的组织，尤其是那些数量快速增长的同志感染者。这一项目由我们基金会首先资助，已建立一种模式以便在其他城市开展。通过这一形式，给新感染者施以同情、安慰和保密，并确保得到中国目前最好的治疗。我们希望，在不久的将来有更多的和更经济的药物可以在临床应用。

在经历艰难的2008年之后，由于中国医疗官员和艾滋病患者对我们的友谊和信任，我们对2009年及以后的工作充满信心。我们的基金会董事张忠誉以及中国联络官刘杰常驻北京，对于我们具有十分重要的作用。我们对与伦敦、牛津和爱丁堡医院的密切合作感到十分满意。爱丁堡西总医院的Clifford Leen教授和位于伦敦帕丁顿的圣玛丽医院的Alan Smith医生去年与我们一起访问了中国，我们所资助的中国医生也造访了英国的医院，最近两批医生来自北京的地坛医院和乌鲁木齐的新疆传染病医院。

玛丽金诺斯慈善基金会主席伊丽莎白·石友思女士仍旧与我们一起议事和访问中国。感谢玛丽金诺斯慈善基金会的经济支持。该基金会是为了纪念其母亲玛丽·金诺斯而设立。姜石松博士依然勤奋的为我们基金会联系英国和中国起了桥梁的作用。我们的董事（我的侄女）Nathalie接管了日常的财务工作，她的住所成为我们的注册办公室，而Ines Lock依然是我们的秘书。我们希望目前的安排对于我们的朋友和支持者是一个高效而又透明的组织结构。

基金董事会对于捐助的朋友们感激不尽，即使在金融风暴的袭击下，捐助也毫不间断，从而使我们能够维持和加强在中国的活动。在此我特别提及在北京的朋友Daniel和Sally Zhou，他们资助了我们在中国的旅行费用；此外，还要提及高盛银行亚洲分行，他们热情参与资助了我们的部分工作。

同样，贝利马丁在美国的慈善机构美国朋友基金会得到的资助也创新高。美国朋友基金会独立于贝利马丁基金会，它具有501(c) (使捐赠人减税) 的资格。美国朋友基金会的宗旨与我们相同。它通过我们资助了几个项目。我们万分感谢美国朋友基金会的董事兼财务总监和秘书Carol Dauber女士，感谢她无私奉献，精心管理基金会。感谢美国董事Michael Leigh, Rosita Sarnoff, Philip Goodeve和Noel Sanborn。我们的朋友——美国国会图书馆的John Pull和哈佛大学Dana Farber癌症研究所的James Chen已以顾问加入美国朋友基金会。Linda Lee仍是美国朋友基金会的西海岸主任，Victoria Sanborn仍为美国朋友基金会的牧师。

Barry & Martin's Prize 2008



The Trustees decided that our 9th Annual Prize should draw attention to the high rate of increase of HIV infection among gay men, and that we should recognise two exceptional HIV positive gay men, who have been prepared to "come out" as both gay and HIV positive, and who are at the same time devoting all their time to helping others. Our award ceremony took place in Beijing at the beginning of a 3-day seminar co-sponsored by the National Centre for Disease Control and our Trust. The subject of the seminar was MSM (men having sex with men). It was coordinated by Professor Zhang Beichuan of Qingdao (our original prize winner in 2000). The photograph above left shows our prizewinner Murong Feng (Xiao Feng) with his parents, from Baoding, Hebei. Xiao Feng's parents have strongly supported their son. The photograph at above right shows the two coordinators of our prizegiving ceremony, Professor Zhang Konglai and Secretary General Cai Jiming of the Chinese Preventive Medicine Association.

At below left is a photograph taken in Ming Fang's Beijing flat showing our two prizewinners at centre, on either side of the Chairman, at left is our Trustee Eugene Chang and at right is Zhen Li of the Canada-China Cooperation Support Unit of the Civil Society Programme. Following the 3-day seminar the Chairman visited Baoding in Hebei (the province which surrounds Beijing) where we called on the local centre for disease control and participated in a seminar for HIV positive patients of Baoding and other towns. The photo below right, again with our prizewinners at centre, was taken in Baoding.



Chengdu I The Sichuan Earthquake



Following the earthquake in Sichuan on 12 May 2009, we took immediate steps to provide some support for the victims, especially the young, as well as HIV affected people. As we had a long and trusting relationship with the Chengdu Gay Care Organisation (CGCO) we asked its leader Dr. Wang Xiaodong if his group would use our donation to reach out to the victims in Dujiangyan. The CGCO responded enthusiastically and arranged to bring medical supplies, blankets, school books and study materials to the surviving school children, whose schools had been destroyed. Beijing
The Quiet Garden



The Beijing You'an Hospital proposed to us the establishment of a Quiet Garden Centre within the hospital at which newly infected HIV patients, especially gay men, could come for counselling and comfort. This project has been taken forward by Nursing Professor Fu Yan, funded by our Trust. This has been most successful in reaching out to these vulnerable people at a time of fast increasing infection. The photograph above was taken soon after the opening of the Quiet Garden with nurses and volunteers, from left Jet Liu of our Trust; Dr. Feng and Bei Fang, volunteers; Ming Fang Song of our Trust; Dr. Bai, leader of the Quiet Garden; Nurse Fu Yan; the Chairman; Nurse Gao and our Trustee Eugene Chang.

The Quiet Garden organises frequent “activities” for the patients often in the suburbs of Beijing, sometimes lasting for the whole weekend. This greatly helps to relax the newly infected patients, and they realise they are not alone. Below left the Chairman is caught in one of the games, and below right our Trustee, Eugene Chang, gives forth his angelic voice.



Xinjiang I Urumqi



The Xinjiang Uighur Autonomous Region is one sixth of the land area of China. The local people are predominantly the Muslim Uighurs, who are among the most vulnerable to HIV in China, because of the country's long borders with Russia, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, Afghanistan and Pakistan. Our Trust is very active in the two most affected areas namely the capital Urumqi and Yili Prefecture. We work closely with the Xinjiang Infectious Diseases Hospital, where we support a facility for outpatients (photo above), and we contribute to the needs of the inpatients. The hospital has more than a 100 inpatients for Aids, more than any other hospital in China. These poor people usually present at an advanced stage of their infection, since they are worried about the cost and the stigma.

Yili is the most HIV affected prefecture of Xinjiang. We have established a relationship with the Yining City Hospital and are supporting their work (photos above and below).



They were not isolated or stigmatised at the end. The Needle Syringe Centre continues to reach out to drug infected HIV patients, with the cooperation of the local authorities and police.



**Yunnan I
Simao Prefecture**



We visited Simao Prefecture in the far south of Yunnan, famous for its Pu'er tea. We have been working here since we gave our 2001 prize to Wang Chun of the Prefectural CDC. On this visit we went to the southernmost county of Menglian where we spent the afternoon with Aids patients and volunteers and officials (above). On the following day we visited Lancang Prefecture, the home of the Lahu people, who are mainly Christians. There are many churches around Lancang and the churches play an important role in reaching out to Aids patients. In the photo below Wang Chun is standing at centre in yellow. We have received traditional Lahu handbags.

The Peggy Health Centre in Dali has been commended by the National CDC as the best Aids facility in the whole of China, with the least fatalities and the highest adherence.
