Chairman's Statement

The Trustees have pleasure in presenting the 13th Annual Report on our work in HIV/Aids education, prevention, treatment and care in China.

We have continued in 2009 to build on the relations of trust which we have established with hospitals and doctors and their patients around China since our foundation in 1996.

Our Barry & Martin's Prizes for 2009 represented our 10th annual awards, since our first prizegiving in 2000. We try each year to reward different people and institutions around China, for different aspects of work in Aids prevention and care. For 2009 we gave 2 prizes, one in Longchuan County, Dehong Prefecture, Yunnan, to a village doctor Yin Zuluan; and the other in Deng Feng City, Zhengzhou, Henan, to Niu Quan Ji, a doctor working among infected villagers. In each case the prize drew local and national attention to individuals and groups who had done excellent work in Aids care.

We have over many years given priority to the two infectious diseases hospitals in Beijing, the Ditan and the You'an, because their work sets an example throughout China of unprejudiced and up-to-date and confidential treatment of HIV/Aids. We do similar work with other hospitals in China, especially in Xinjiang, Yunnan and Sichuan, all provinces with high rates of HIV infection.

Our cooperation with these hospitals includes the exchange of medical personnel. Over the last year we sponsored 2 doctors from Urumqi, Xinjiang to visit London for training, and a doctor and a nurse from Chengdu, Sichuan to visit Edinburgh. We also sponsor the visits of doctors and nurses from the United Kingdom to China.

We are recognised in China as pioneers in the support of the gay community, among whom HIV infection continues to rise rapidly – in the cities and in the countryside. We support the work which the hospitals are doing among gay patients, and we have contributed for many years to gay groups in more than 20 provinces of China. These gay groups operate hotlines, websites and outreach to infected and vulnerable people, and they cooperate with their local hospitals, the local Red Cross and Centres for Disease Control.

We have received welcome recognition of our work in China, with an award to our Chairman by the Ministry of Health of the People's Republic, for Outstanding Contribution to China, in the field of HIV/Aids. The photograph below shows the Minister of Health, Dr. Chen Zhu, bestowing the award on our Chairman, in Shanghai on 24 November, 2009.



We operate as a small team, relying on volunteer support from our friends in China and the United Kingdom. We have been glad to appoint Dr. Li Xu Macrae, of Birmingham, as an Adviser, following her excellent outreach to patients in Beijing and Henan.

The cooperation with our Director Dr. Shisong Jiang, in Oxford, and our Trustee Eugene Chang, in Beijing, has ensured efficient and consistent contact with our friends around China. This is buttressed with the company and support of our partner Elizabeth Shields of Mary Kinross Charitable Trust in our frequent travels in China.

The Chelsea & Westminster Hospital, under the leadership of Professors Brian Gazzard and Frances Gotch, has been our principal partner over 14 years since our foundation. This team has enabled continuous training visits of doctors and nurses between the United Kingdom and China. We also cooperate, regularly and happily, with St. Mary's Hospital Paddington, with Bart's and The London Hospital, and with Western General Hospital in Edinburgh.

Our financial position has again been helped by the wonderful and consistent gifts of our many friends. We have quite a family feeling with our donors, many of whom have joined us in visits to China, most recently in Xinjiang in September. Our finances have in fact been strengthened by gifts in kind, including the generosity of Daniel and Sally Zhou, who have paid for all our domestic flights in China; and the hospitality of many friends around China has contributed to our low overheads.

China is a richer and more powerful country than it was when we started our work 14 years ago. Our small grants in the early years were often the only support available. The gay group in Nanjing wrote to us at the beginning of the decade that we were "bringing hot coals through the snow". Now, our grants are small in comparison to the resources of China, as well those of the big international institutions. But China also recognises that health reform has not moved as fast as economic reform. Our example acts as an encouragement to Chinese officials in developing the work which they know is necessary. We try in this context to maintain a standard of integrity which attracts the best members of Chinese society to work with us. A modest grant from our Trust can sometimes stimulate much larger support from government.

As an English charity we are naturally affected by the British economy, most significantly by zero interest rates and the decline of sterling. We have tried to cushion this impact by investing in Hong Kong blue chips, giving an average yield around 4 per cent, and we are grateful to Aubrey Li Kwok Sing for his advice on our investments.



贝利马丁基金会 2009 年度报告

基金会全体董事在此汇报 2009 年我们在中国进行艾滋病教育、预防、治疗及关爱所做的工作。

2009 年我们继续巩固自 1996 年基金会成立以来我们与许多医院、医务人员及其病人建立的信任关系。

2009 年贝利马丁奖是我们自 2000 年颁奖以来第十次年度奖。我们希望能在中国给不同地方、不同领域中为艾滋病教育及关怀做出贡献的各种不同人员颁奖。2009 年我们颁发了两个奖：一个颁给了云南德宏陇川的乡村医生尹祖鸾；另一个颁给了河南郑州登封为乡村感染者服务的牛全记医生。这两个奖的目的都是希望全国及当地关注获奖者在艾滋病关怀领域中所做的出色工作。

许多年以来，我们都一直将与北京地坛医院和佑安医院的合作放在很重要的位置。他们在为病人提供无歧视、保护隐私及最先进的治疗方面为全中国树立了榜样。我们在中国其它地方比如新疆、云南及四川等艾滋病高发区也有类似的合作。

我们与这些医院的合作包括医务人员的培训。去年，我们资助了两名新疆乌鲁木齐的医生来伦敦培训；四川成都的一名医生一名护士到爱丁堡培训。我们也资助英国的医生护士来中国工作。

我们在同性恋社区的工作是领先的。不管是城市还是乡村，艾滋病在同性恋中的感染率都是很高的。我们支持医院为同性恋人群所做的工作。我们也支持中国 20 个省的同性恋社区组织。这些组织通过电话热线、网页及外展的形式帮助艾滋病感染者及易感人群；他们还与当地的医院、红十字会及疾病控制中心合作。

我们的工作得到了中国的认可，基金会主席荣获了由中国卫生部颁发的杰出贡献奖。下面的照片是卫生部长陈竺在 2009 年 11 月 24 日为基金会主席颁奖时的情景。

我们基金会是小团队运作，依赖于我们在中国和英国朋友们的志愿帮助。我们非常高兴邀请来自伯明翰的许力博士担任基金会顾问。在这之前，她曾在北京及河南帮助艾滋病患者。

通过基金会主任姜石松博士（牛津）及基金会董事张忠誉（北京）的协调，我们一直与中国保持密切及有效的联系。我们的工作得到我们的工作伙伴，英国玛丽金诺丝基金会及其主席伊丽莎白·石友思女士的支持。伊丽莎白经常和我们一起到中国旅行。

伦敦的晨曦医院及该医院的 Brian Gazzard 教授、Frances Gotch 教授在过去的 14 年中一直是我们在英国的主要合作伙伴。与他们的合作使对中国医生护士培训工作得以保障。我们还经常与伦敦另外两家医院（圣玛丽医院、巴斯伦敦医院）及位于爱丁堡的西总医院有着很愉快的合作。


我们良好的财政状况也与我们朋友的不断帮助分不开。我们与我们的捐助者有如一家。他们中的很多人曾与我们一起访问中国。最近一次是 2009 年 9 月访问新疆。我们的财政还因得到其他形式的捐助得以巩固，比如周葛夫妇慷慨捐赠我们所有在中国的国内机票；在中国我们得到许多朋友的热情款待，对降低行政开销有很大帮助。

中国现在与 14 年前基金会刚开始工作比，富有而强大了。那时候，我们小小的资助常常是唯一的资助。10 年前，南京的同志组织写信给我们，说我们的资助是“雪中送炭”。现在，我们的资助与中国自己的以及其他大的国际组织的资金比是很小的。但中国政府知道他们在卫生领域的改革落后于经济改革。我们具有示范性的项目可以鼓励中国政府官员开展他们尚未开始但认为有必要的工作。而且我们所保持的高度诚信吸引着中国社会最出色的人群与我们一起工作。一些由我们基金会资助的中小项目有时会吸引到政府部门更大的支持。

作为一个英国的慈善机构，我们自然受到英国经济尤其是零利率及英镑贬值的影响。为减少负面影响，我们投资了香港的蓝筹股，我们投资的平均回报大约是 4%。感谢李国星在投资方面不吝赐教。

着重于香港的投资组合对我们度过经济危机是一种明智的选择，同时也反映出我们基金会的特点 - 香港也是贝利的故乡，我们基金会因纪念贝利而成立。贝利的照片见下。

我们也为我们美国的联系而骄傲 – 我们与贝利马丁美国朋友基金（简称美国朋友基金）的合作。Carol Dauber 作为董事、财会及秘书而管理着美国朋友基金。我们衷心地感谢她的工作。同时也感谢其他同仁：Philip Goodeve, Michael Leigh, Noel Sanborn and Rosita Sarnoff 为董事；Linda Lee 兼任美国朋友基金西海岸主任；James Chen (波士顿)、John Pull (华盛顿特区) 及 Tom Warne 为顾问；Victoria Sanborn 为宗教指导。

**Basis of independent

Barry & Martin's Prizes 2009

Longchuan County, Dehong Prefecture, Yunnan

We awarded the first of our 2009 prizes to Dr. Yin Zuluan of Guangsong Village, Jingnan Township, Longchuan County, Dehong Prefecture, Yunnan Province. Dr. Yin and her brother were educated in medicine by their father, in the barefoot doctor tradition, and received further training at county and prefectural level.

Longchuan County is on the Burmese border. Like many border areas of China, the local people are vulnerable to HIV because of smuggling and cheap availability of drugs. Dr Yin has energetically educated local people in Aids prevention, and reached out to vulnerable people, and cared for old people and orphans. Her Loving Mutual Aid Group and Orphans Activity Group have helped to reduce discrimination.

Xinjiang

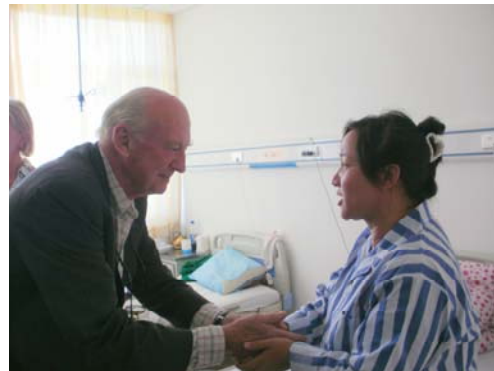
The Xinjiang Uyghur Autonomous Region constitutes one sixth of the land area of China, and it is one of the most vulnerable to HIV infection, because of drug smuggling across its many borders, including Kazakhstan, Russia, Afghanistan and Kyrgyzstan. We have been making annual visits since 2003, and we work cooperatively with local hospitals and officials, and we have had several exchanges of doctors between Xinjiang and London. We brought several of our friends and supporters on our latest visit in September 2009, and were warmly welcomed at a time of political tension, when most foreign delegations had cancelled.

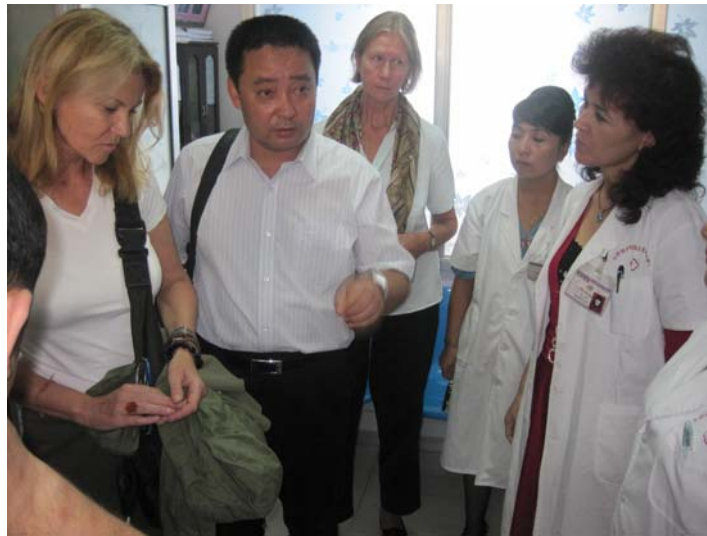

Gay Developments in China: 2009

1) Zhang Beichuan and “Friends Magazine”

Professor Zhang Beichuan of Qingdao is the most outstanding doctor in reaching out to the gay community and educating Chinese society on homosexuality. His principal vehicle, since 1998, has been his bi-monthly Friends Magazine. Sadly the funding from Ford Foundation has run out, and the final edition is being produced this spring. The Chairman wrote the following article for the final edition:

Goodbye “Friends”

When I first came to China 25 years ago, I was developing my bank's business and had no knowledge of China's gay community. I had many gay Chinese friends in England and America, because my partner Barry was Chinese from Hong Kong, but the gay scene in China was invisible.

It was indeed 25 years ago that the first of Barry's and my Chinese friends in New York, Bob Wong, died of Aids, and in the following year we lost many Chinese friends in London, Hong Kong and America. Barry himself died in 1996. During these early years I continued to travel to China and it was obvious to me that China would suffer from the Aids epidemic, and that gay men in China would be especially vulnerable.

I decided therefore to see what I could do to contribute to Aids care and prevention in China, and I established Barry & Martin's Trust in 1996 to cooperate between England and China in this field. I wrote to Dr. Gazzard of Chelsea & Westminster Hospital in London to propose that we start sending doctors and nurses to China to explain our approach to Aids care in England. One of the Chinese doctors working with Dr. Gazzard, Dr. Jiang Shisong, kindly offered to introduce me to officials in Beijing, at the Ministry of Health and the Chinese Academy of Preventive Medicine, and I was thus able in June 1996 to meet several of these officials including Vice Minister Yin Dakui and Professors Zeng Yi, Chen Chunming and Wang Ke An, and Director Shen Jie at the Ministry of Health. They all told me that they were well aware of the vulnerability of gay men to HIV infection, but that they had very little access to and knowledge of the gay community.

Later in 1996 I received from the Ministry of Health and UNAIDS a list of projects which foreign donors might consider in helping with HIV/Aids in China. At the end of this list was the name of Professor Zhang Beichuan of Qingdao, who was working on homosexuality in China. My new friend Dr. Jiang Shisong encouraged me to make contact with Zhang Beichuan, and gave me Dr. Zhang's book on homosexuality. I therefore took the earliest opportunity to fly over to Qingdao, early in 1997, to meet him.

Dr. Zhang immediately became my close and trusted friend. Indeed he and Professor Xu Lianzhi of Beijing You'an Hospital were the two people who influenced and guided me in my early contacts on HIV/Aids care in China. Dr. Zhang's great intellect, and his medical and historical knowledge, illuminated my understanding of China and its lively gay community. His forceful and persistent character, combined with his kindness and hard work, have set him up as a shining example to gay people around China, and have earned him the trust of officials and doctors in Beijing and around China.

Dr. Zhang knew in those early days how huge was the gay population of China. He knew that gays formed the same percentage of China's population as they did in America, Europe and elsewhere. He therefore correctly contradicted people in China who said that gays were an insignificant group. He also maintained confidential correspondence with thousands of gay men around China – many of them in high positions in government – making it clear that there were gay people at all levels of Chinese society – and that it was the duty of government to protect them, and to banish discrimination, and to help gay people to avoid HIV and to care for those who contracted this infection.

"Friends" magazine was central to Dr. Zhang's efforts to reach out to the gay community in China, and at the same time to set out in sober and factual terms the problems which faced gay people. It enabled gay people in the remotest parts of China to realise that they were not alone, and that they were indeed among "friends". The magazine also reached out to health officials and doctors, and helped them to understand and reach out to gay men and to fulfil their role in caring for sick people and preventing the spread of the epidemic.

I am sad to say goodbye to "Friends". Dr. Zhang's extraordinary hard work in producing the magazine has greatly benefited thousands, and possibly millions, of people. His views have become widely accepted. We live in a world where – thanks to the internet – much of the information which Dr. Zhang conveyed is available instantly and electronically. But at the heart of Dr. Zhang's work, both with "Friends" and with all his other hard work, is his humanity and kindness to his fellow men, and his guidance as to how gay men and women could function in the unique society and conditions of China.

2) The Quiet Garden, Beijing You'an Hospital, and Dr. Bai Zhixue

The Quiet Garden was established under our Trust's sponsorship in 2007. The author of the project was Nurse Fu Yan, and the manager was Dr. Bai Zhixue, of the Hui people, from Tianjin. Under Dr. Bai's leadership, the Quiet Garden became the most admired outreach to newly infected HIV-positive people, especially the gays. Sadly Dr. Bai died suddenly in January 2010 – 3 days after we had visited him in hospital.

The following is a translation by the hospital of a speech at Dr. Bai's funeral service in January 2010.

Mr. Bai, a volunteer of Home of Loving & Care of You An Hospital and project manager of Quiet Garden, died at the age of 55 and died of sudden onset of acute myocardial infarction at 12:59 am on 16 January 2010, in Beijing You An Hospital.

Born on 28 December 1954 in Tianjin, Mr. Bai graduated from a nursing school in Tianjin, and he was assigned to work for a hospital in the same year. In 1985, he was transferred to work for operation room of a Beijing hospital.

In 2006, Mr. Bai resigned from the hospital because of the physical health problems, and became a volunteer of Home of Loving & Care of You An Hospital and dedicated to psychological crisis intervention and care for people living with HIV/AIDS. Since the establishment of Quiet Garden-Home of Loving & Care of You An Hospital in 2007, Mr. Bai became the project manager.

Mr. Bai had always been serious and responsible to work with his commitment. He was always nice, kind, gentle and peaceful to the people living with HIV/AIDS. He devoted a lot to the construction and development of Quiet Garden-Home of Loving & Care of You An Hospital. All the people living with HIV/AIDS, who used to contact him, appreciated a lot for all the help, care and support from Mr. Bai.

In recent years, Mr. Bai summarized the experience of work constantly, he had extensive influence in AIDS areas, and he always tried his best to expand the pattern of Quiet Garden-Home of Loving & Care of You An Hospital to others. He became a model in China's AIDS care areas due to his rigorous, pragmatic and hard-working spirit.

Mr. Bai's lifetime was a conscientious, hard-working and selfless-devotion lifetime. He created extraordinary performance in ordinary post. He had been elected as the council member of Chinese Association of STD and AIDS Prevention and Control and the honorary ambassador trainer of UNICEF.

Mr. Bai's leaving, not just a loss for Home of Loving & Care of You An Hospital, a loss for Quiet Garden, but also a big loss for China AIDS care areas.

We will continue to practice the concept of understanding, quiet, harmony and sincerity of Quiet Garden·Home of Loving &.Care of You An Hospital.

4) Judge Edwin Cameron of South Africa

Judge Edwin Cameron visited China in January 2010, at the initiative and invitation of UNAIDS. Edwin is justice of the constitutional court of South Africa, and is famous for being “out” as both gay and HIV positive. He is the only public official in the whole of Africa to admit this situation. We consider him the most sympathetic and persuasive Aids ambassador in the world, and for Martin and Eugene, this meeting was our “Mandela moment”. Eugene is holding the book which we have edited on Dr. Zhang Beichuan's 2008 conference on homosexuality and gay rights. Martin is holding the Queer Comrades video which we have produced with interviews in Chinese with Edwin and with Chinese gay HIV positive men.
