Chairman's Statement

The Trustees have pleasure in presenting our 15th Annual Report of our work in and with China.

Our mission in China remains to encourage education, treatment and care in the field of HIV, and in particular combating prejudice, discrimination and stigma.

As China has become dominant in economic terms, social development has lagged behind; and as the great cities glitter with confident architecture and infrastructure, there remains poverty and ignorance in the countryside and mountain areas, and among the minority peoples; and as excellent hospitals are being built in provincial capitals, access to them is expensive and beyond the means of poor patients.

In these conditions, our regular presence in China has proved helpful to those responsible for public health in China; and our journeys among the poorest and most vulnerable people have enabled them to feel that they are not alone; and, in a society where people sometimes attribute a sense of guilt towards sexual or drug-related infection, we try to promote compassion towards all patients.

We have now been working for 16 years in this field in China. This may be a short time, but it is a long time in the course of the epidemic in China, and it spans a period of enormous change. Moreover, when we started in 1996, HIV infection was quite new in China, and we have tried to be consistent in our approach throughout this period. We therefore have a firmly established position in China in this second decade of the 21st century, and our access to those who need our help gets better as we are increasingly trusted in official and medical circles.

This is the context in which we operate in China, keeping our activities among people we have learnt to trust, and expanding modestly every year. We are perhaps best known in China for our prizes. We awarded our 12th annual prizes in 2011. On this occasion we came to Chengdu, Sichuan, and gave two prizes: one to Madam Wen Xianmin and the Chengdu Contagious Diseases Hospital; and the other to Wang Xiaodong and the Chengdu Gay Care Organisation (CGCO). This combination of a government hospital and a private NGO fitted the spirit of modern China, and rewarded individuals and organisations who had set examples by their good work in HIV. The hospital has responsibility for Aids training, treatment and care throughout the large and vulnerable province of Sichuan. The gay group is one of the oldest and best in China, and was originally started with the help of our UK's development ministry, DfID. Following our prizegiving, Wang Xiaodong was among the small group invited for a discussion with Prime Minister Wen Jiabao on 1 December, World Aids Day. This was the first time that the Prime Minister has had a formal meeting with a gay NGO.

We continue to work with several hospitals around China especially the You'an and Ditan in Beijing, with the infectious diseases hospitals in Urumqi and Yining City in Xinjiang, with hospitals in Yunnan, including the Peggy Health Centre at No. 2 Hospital in Dali, and with Chengdu Contagious and others. This cooperation includes exchanges of doctors and nurses between China and the UK; support for poor patients and their families; and outreach to gay HIV-positive people. Infection among the gay community continues to rise rapidly, and we have been asked twice to co-sponsor seminars on homosexuality with the Chinese government. Our outreach to gay groups around China, over many years, has encouraged health officials to take this community seriously, and in province after province we encounter large concentrations of gay HIV-positive men. We have dinner with them and share their anxieties and concerns. We support more than 2 dozen gay groups around China, with particular emphasis towards the HIV-positive groups.

With all these activities, we have many friends around China, and it is a challenge to keep up with the gay groups which we support in more than two thirds of the provinces of China, and with the doctors and officials who like to work with us. Among the photographs in this document, there are records of our visits over the last year around many distant parts, in the south, west, northwest and centre – and we receive the warmest welcomes everywhere. We fly many thousands of miles and I would like to express our thanks to Daniel & Sally Zhou, who have paid our core group's domestic airfares for some years.


In the same way, we are encouraged and supported by many friends outside China, with the financial support of our donors, who have maintained their generosity in difficult economic times, and with the cooperation of the doctors and nurses of hospitals in the UK who send their staff to China, and receive the medical visitors from China. Our cooperation with Chelsea & Westminster Hospital goes back to our beginnings in 1996, and St. Mary's Paddington, Bart's and The London, and Western General in Edinburgh, have all contributed their people and their time.

Many of the donors to our Trust have given consistently year after year, and we are happy that our financial position remains strong, and that our dividend income has grown. This has partially compensated for the virtual disappearance of interest income in recent years. We are grateful to our Director Shisong Jiang, and our Trustees Eugene Chang in Beijing and my niece Nathalie in London for their coordination of our activities and our finances; and to Elizabeth Shields of The Mary Kinross Charitable Trust, over 25 visits with us to China.

We are also helped by our friends at Barry & Martin America, where Carol Dauber in New York coordinates our activities in the USA, as Director, Secretary & Treasurer. We welcome Vanessa Li as a Director. Barry & Martin America has been supporting Aids Relief Fund for China, San Francisco, under its leader Humphrey Wou, and the Chinese gay website Aibai. 2011 年贝利马丁基金会年度报告

董事会在此进行第十五个年度报告。我们在中国的工作的目标仍然是促进在艾滋病领域中的教育、治疗、关怀，特别是反对偏见、歧视和污辱。

中国已成为经济强国，但社会发展却相对滞后。虽然城市中充满光彩夺目与自信的建筑和基础设施，然而在农村、山区及少数民族地区，贫穷与愚昧依然存在。各省会城市都在建设现代化医院，而昂贵的费用却让许多贫困的病人望而却步。

在这样的情况下，我们对中国的定期访问对中国的公共卫生管理者有一定帮助；我们对最贫穷和最弱势的群体的帮助使他们感到他们并不孤单；在一个歧视因性及毒品引起的传染病的社会里，我们提倡予以所有病人同情心。

我们已在中国工作了 16 年。这也许是一段短暂的时期，但对中国的艾滋病流行来说却是一段很长的时期，一段经历巨变的时期。当 1996 年我们开始在中国的工作时，艾滋病在中国刚刚开始，我们持之以恒工作至今（二十一世纪第二个十年），因此我们在中国赢得了声誉。我们帮助那些需要帮助的人并改善了他们的健康，因此我们也赢得了政府官员及医学界的信任。

我们在中国的工作原则是和我们信任的人合作，并逐年扩展工作范围。最被人们熟知的工作要数贝利马丁奖了。在 2011 年，我们颁发了第 12 届贝利马丁奖。我们来到四川成都。这届贝利马丁奖分成两部分：一部分颁给了温贤敏女士及成都传染病院；另一部分颁给了王晓冬及成都同乐关爱组织。政府管理的医院与非政府组织合作符合现代中国精神。获奖的个人与组织以他们在艾滋病领域中的出色工作为他人树立了榜样。成都传染病院负责幅员广阔及艾滋重灾区四川全省的艾滋病医疗培训与关怀。成都同乐小组是中国最早和最好的非政府组织之一，是早年在英国海外发展署的帮助下建立的。在获奖之后，王晓冬又于 12 月 1 日世界艾滋病日与其他少数几个人一道应邀与温家宝总理讨论与艾滋病相关的议题。这是中国国务院总理首次正式接见一个与同志有关的组织。

我们继续与中国几家医院合作，特别是北京地坛与佑安医院、位于新疆乌鲁木齐的新疆传染病院、新疆伊宁市人民医院、云南大理市第二人民医院佩吉健康中心以及成都传染病院。合作的方式包括与英国医务人员的相互交流、对贫困病人及其家庭的支持、对同志感染者的外展工作。艾滋病在同志人群的感染率继续迅速增长。中国政府已经两次和我们一道组织研讨会讨论与同性恋有关的问题。我们多年来在中国各地对同志人群的外展工作，促进了卫生官员们对这一人群的认真关注。从一省到又一省，我们见到了大量的同志感染人群。我们与他们共同进餐，分担他们的焦虑与忧虑。我们在中国资助了二十多个同志小组，特别是感染者小组。

上述的这些活动，使我们在中国结交了很多朋友。我们资助的同志小组分布在中国三分之二的省份，与他们及许多愿意与我们合作的医生、官员保持联系是一件极具挑战的事。此年度报告所附照片记录了我们访问中国各地，包括边远地区（南部、西部、西南部及中部）的足迹。在每处受到热烈欢迎。我们飞行了万水千山，感谢周舸夫妇几年来一直慷慨支付我们在中国的旅行费用。

同样，我们得到中国以外的许多朋友的资助。他们在经济困难时期仍然慷慨解囊。英国的医生护士也非常配合我们，他们选派人员前往中国，同时接待中国的医生护士。我们与英国伦敦晨曦医院的合作可追溯到 1996 年；伦敦的圣玛丽医院、巴斯伦敦医院及爱丁堡的西总医院也都不惜时间与人力与我们合作。

资助我们基金会的捐赠者都是年复一年地支持我们。我们很高兴我们的财政状况良好。股票红利收入增加，抵消了因利息降低所造成的损失。我们特别要感谢基金会主任姜石松及两位董事，即居住北京的张忠誉，以及我侄女娜塔莉。感谢他们在协调基金会各项活动及财务的努力。另外，玛丽金诺丝基金会主席伊丽莎白·石友思同我们一起访问中国已超过 25 次。

我们还要感谢贝利马丁基金会美国分支。Carol Dauber 在纽约作为董事、秘书及财务协调各项活动。我们欢迎李爱华加入董事的行列。贝利马丁基金会美国分支支持了以乌玺堃为领导的 Aids Relief Fund for China 的活动，他们在同志人群中进行艾滋病检测及咨询工作。贝利马丁基金会美国分支还资助爱白网站。

PRIZEGIVING IN CHENGDU



Above, our 2011 prizewinners Wang Xiaodong (left) of Chengdu Gay Care Organisation and Dr. Wen Xianmin (right) of Chengdu Contagious Diseases Hospital. The gay group has done outstanding work in outreach to gay men in the Aids epidemic. The hospital has cooperated with the gay group to assist in treatment and counselling of patients. It is the leading hospital in HIV treatment in the province of Sichuan. Our Trust has worked with it for many years and we have had exchanges of doctors and nurses with hospitals in the UK. The hospital is moving this year into a new building, with increased responsibility for training and treatment in the whole province, and it wishes to increase its cooperation with the UK.



Above left, our Consul General in Chongqing, Simon Lever, came to Chengdu for our prizegiving. On this occasion we also visited some patients together with Wen Xianmin and her colleagues. Simon had much experience of Aids in the late 90's, when he was British Consul in Chiang Mai, Thailand, and his speech on this subject was greatly appreciated at the prizegiving ceremony.

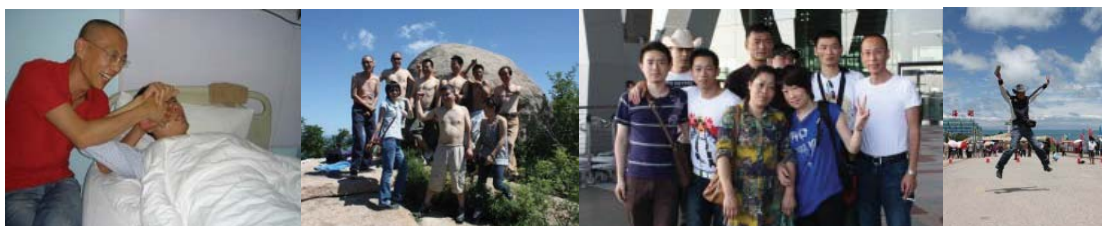

BEIJING, THE YOU'AN & DITAN HOSPITALS

We continue to cooperate closely with the two principal infectious diseases hospitals in Beijing, the You'an and the Ditan. In November 2011 we arranged for our Parliamentary Under Secretary State for Health, Anne Milton, to visit the You'an Hospital and its Quiet Garden project, which we have sponsored for some years and which provides counselling to newly-infected gay patients. Our 2010 prizewinner, Nurse Fu Yan (holding a blue file) is explaining to our Minister (in blue dress). The Minister has a nursing background (at Bart's & The London Hospital) and her understanding of Aids counselling and care led to a constructive dialogue.



We have worked with the Red Ribbon Centre at the Beijing Ditan Hospital since it was founded in 1998. At left is Nurse Wang Kerong, our 2004 prizewinner, who is now a National Model Worker, and next to her is Party Secretary Teng. The President of the hospital Jiang Yong Li is standing at centre. Our adviser Xu Keyi, the founder of the Centre, is third from right. Far right is Dr. Lun Wen Hui, head of HIV at the hospital. We have supported for many years an outreach to gay HIV positive patients at the hospital. This was run by Lao Ji and the photos below show some of Lao Ji's activities with the patients – he is in a red shirt in the left hand photo.



XINJIANG



We maintain our strong contacts in Xinjiang, particularly in the two highest areas of infection, namely the capital Urumqi and Yili prefecture and its capital Yining City. We work mainly through Xinjiang Infectious Diseases Hospital in Urumqi and Yining City Hospital. In addition we sponsor exchanges of doctors and nurses between Xinjiang and the UK, and we support gay groups in several of the major towns, and have an ongoing project among the Muslim Uighur people. In the photo above we are at the Yining City Hospital. Our 2010 prizewinner Madam Chang Yanling is standing between Elizabeth and Shisong. At the right of the front row is Dr. Duan Aixia, in charge of infected children, and next to her is Liu Wei, head of the centre for disease control. GUIYANG, GUIZHOU

We went to Guiyang in November. We had not been there since our workshop in Anshun more than 10 years ago. Guizhou province has one of the highest levels of HIV in China and we were put in touch with a very large number of HIV positive people, partly through the support we have been giving to the gay group in Guiyang and partly through the contacts of our Project Manager Frankie through his QQ group. We thus met a large number of HIV positive people whose leaders are Madam Li Meiyang (second from left in the photo above) and Ji En (leader of the gay HIV positives, not in this photo). The three ladies in white in this photo are from left to right Dr. Jiang Hong, Director Dr. Liu Shui Qing and Nurse Liu Tian Qiong. This photo is at the only hospital in Guiyang which treats Aids patients.

BAODING, HEBEI

Our arrival in Baoding 6 November 2011. Our 2008 prizewinner Xiao Feng is second left between our Beijing Trustee Eugene Chang and our visiting supporter Peter Tustin. Next to Peter is our Project Manager Frankie, then Elizabeth and Martin and at right is Xiao Feng's father. The province of Hebei surrounds Beijing. Baoding, with a population of 10 million is the largest city in the province. Xiao Feng had brought groups from the provincial capital Shijiazhuang to meet us as well as from Hebei's third city Cangzhou. Xiao Feng is one of our heroes of Aids work in China and has done much to help the HIV positive gay community and has been effective in cooperating with the hospitals and centres for disease control of the province. In this he has had the unstinting support of his father and mother – hence our inclusion of this photo with his father at right. The Feng parents and Mother Tang (see below) have done a great deal to help parents of gays in Hebei to accept the homosexuality of their children, and HIV infection also. As China has a one-child family policy, people like Xiao Feng are only sons.



Above left is Mother Tang whose son was gay and who died two years ago. She gave her son every support during his lifetime, and since his death has campaigned for parents to understand their gay children, especially if infected. At centre, Xiao Feng has established a small clinic with two doctors to treat sexual infections. The prices charged are much lower than public hospitals, and the patients get kind treatment, because the public hospitals are not always sympathetic to patients with sexual infections. At right is our group during this visit to Baoding, with some of the visitors from the other cities of Hebei, including a church group from Jinde Charities from Shijiazhuang, led by Rev. John-Ren Dahai and Sister He.

DALI, YUNNAN

It is now 8 years since we established the Peggy Health Centre at No. 2 People's Hospital in Dali, Yunnan, jointly with the local municipality. It continues to be an example to Aids clinics all over China, under the leadership of Dr. Zhang Jianbo. The patients come back to the hospital regularly and the clinic has the lowest proportion of deaths and the highest proportion of adherence. The financial situation is under question at present because the Clinton Foundation used to support it also, but has now withdrawn from China, and the Global Fund will cease support at the end of this year. We are now the only external supporters and we hope that the Government will fill the gap left by the other foreigners. The photo below shows Julia, our Trust's "daughter" now aged 10 and in rather good health. Our Trustee James Lewisohn and his wife Selin are at left.

NANNING, GUANGXI

We visited Nanning, the capital of Guangxi, near the border of Vietnam. Our last visit to Guangxi was 10 years ago when we did a workshop in Liuzhou. Subsequently Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF) established a clinic in Nanning. However MSF withdrew last year and we were encouraged to come to Nanning again. The photo above is taken in the gardens of No. 4 People's Hospital with its director Dr. Huang (third from right). Both Dr. Huang and Chief Nurse Du were doing excellent work in the old buildings of No. 4 Hospital, where they had 90 in-patients, half of whom were co-infections with TB.

Below left, we visit a gay group in Nanning, sponsored by USAID and Family Health International. It is called the Guangxi Green City Rainbow Activity Centre, where the gay staff members received us warmly. However their US funding will run out in June and it is not clear what future arrangements will be made. Below right is a painting at the CDC in Nanning. This painting was done by an HIV-positive inmate of the local prison. The CDC doctors explained to us how they access the prisons for HIV treatment.

WUHAN, HUBEI

We visited our 2003 prizewinner Dr. Gui Xien in Wuhan. Dr. Gui brought a number of his patients from all over Hubei province and neighbouring Henan to meet us. We also visited with 3 of the gay and HIV positive groups, and we were taken round the Zhongnan Hospital to meet the patients. In the photo above at left is Steven, who had done the calligraphy which he gave to Elizabeth and Martin, and at right is Patrick whose violin lessons we have been supporting and who gave a recital to us. The calligraphy is of a famous poem by Du Fu:

*"The good rain knows its season,
when Spring arrives, then it comes.
