## CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT

The Trustees have pleasure in presenting their seventeenth Annual Report for 2013.

We continue to work and support projects in three quarters of the provinces of China, with an emphasis on the border provinces; and we seek to encourage good practice in HIV/Aids care, especially in tackling prejudice, discrimination and stigma.

We awarded our fourteenth annual prizes in Tianjin and Guizhou, recognising examples of excellent cooperation between the government and "non-government organisations".

The character of Aids care and prevention in China has become more domestic. A great deal of international and multi-national support has been withdrawn, as western governments feel that China is rich enough, and they steer their development funds to "poorer" countries.

However, it is our Trust's experience that there is still great poverty in China, especially in the remoter regions; and the withdrawal of foreign funds and expertise is keenly felt among patients and those who look after them. No one with HIV is permitted to work in any branch of government. This institutionalises prejudice, especially in a society where so many are employed by government.


In this climate, we find our visits around China are more welcome than ever. Even though the funds we disburse are tiny, in comparison with the government's contributions, the example we set, and the regularity of our visits, encourage good practice. Our prizes are very much part of this, as we travel to different parts of China to reward good work, and this encourages both the officials and the vulnerable and sick. The Chinese press reports favourably, and our prizes are described in the 'People's Daily' as of national importance.

We are never sure which statistics to follow, but it is clear to us that new infections among the gay community are higher than in any other sector. The more we penetrate around China, the more this feels like New York and San Francisco in the 80's; and our efforts are increasingly directed to these people. We support more than 30 gay and gay/HIV positive groups around China. At the same time, we are mindful of the government's concern about the spread of HIV among the general population.

In Chongqing over the last year, in its principal infectious diseases hospital, more than 30 people have been dying every month from Aids, mainly from the gay community.

We continue to have a stable financial condition, and we are heartened by the generous gifts of our friends, which have enabled us to maintain our grant levels. As I write, sterling has been strengthening against the Chinese Yuan, and this enables us modestly to increase our grants.

We are also grateful to our friends in the United States, where Barry & Martin America continues to receive good support, and we have welcomed younger friends to the Board, namely Alexander Shields and Benjamin Edelshain, in addition to Vanessa Li in the previous year. I set out overleaf the list of donations to Barry & Martin America in 2013.

Barry Chan (1944-1996), in whose memory our Trust operates. This photo shows Barry in Sanya, Hainan Island, the southernmost point of China, some twenty-five years ago.

Our Trust supports a group in Sanya, as well as projects in the other southern provinces of Guangdong, Guangxi and Yunnan, and across Yunnan's border in Myitkyina, Myanmar.

In the west, we have long been active in Xinjiang as well as in other western provinces, Qinghai, Sichuan, Guizhou, Gansu, Shaanxi, Ningxia and Tibet.

We have long supported projects in all 3 northeast provinces, Heilongjiang, Jilin and Liaoning.

In the east, we support projects in Qingdao, Nanjing and Fuzhou in addition to Guangzhou and Tianjin.

On the Yangtse river we support projects in Nanjing, Wuhan and Chongqing. We are also active in Beijing and in Hebei, the province which surrounds Beijing, and in Shanxi, Henan, Hunan and Anhui.

## 主席报告

董事会在此做 2013 年，也是第十七年度的报告。

我们继续在中国四分之三的省份工作，重点是边境省份；我们鼓励优秀的艾滋病关怀实践 – 特别是在消除偏见、歧视及羞辱方面的努力。

第十四届贝利马丁奖颁发给天津及贵州以鼓励政府及非政府组织的出色合作。

中国目前的艾滋病预防与关怀越来越中国化。大批的国际组织和跨国机构都从中国撤走 – 西方政府觉得中国越来越富有，因此他们将发展基金投到他们认为“更贫穷”的国家。

但是我们基金会的经验是中国目前仍然是个贫穷的，尤其是在偏远地区。外国资金和专家的撤离所造成的损害已明显地在病人及他们护理者中体现。

在这种情况下，我们基金会在中国各地都更受欢迎。虽然我们的基金规模与中国政府投入的比要小的多，但我们树立的榜样、以及我们定期的访问促进了良好的实践。贝利马丁奖也是树立榜样的一部分：每当我们访问中国不同地区并颁发贝利马丁奖，都是对官员、易感人群及病人的一种鼓励。中国媒体都正面报道，人民日报把我们的奖描述为具有国家级的重要性。

我们虽然不知的哪些统计数字可靠，但我们绝对肯定新感染病人在同性恋社区远高于其他人群。越深入中国，我们越觉得情况象 80 年代的纽约和旧金山。我们的努力将向这方面发展。我们在全中国支持 30 多个同性恋及 HIV 阳性同性恋组织。

在重庆一家主要的传染病院，去年一年每月有约 30 人死于艾滋病，这些人主要来自同性恋社区。

我们的财务状况依然很稳定，衷心感谢朋友们慷慨捐助是我们一直保持在中国的资助水平。确实，在我写这个报告的同时，英镑对人民币的汇率正在上升，这使我们可以适当增加支持力度。

非常感谢美国的朋友。贝利马丁美国基金会得到很好的捐助。欢迎年轻一代加入董事会：Alexander Shields, Benjamin Edelshain 以及去年加入董事会的李爱华。

## GUIZHOU PRIZEGIVING 1



Our prizegiving in Guiyang, Guizhou, was particularly joyful. Guizhou is one of the poorest provinces of China. The HIV infection rate is high, and less is known about Guizhou than its neighbouring provinces of Yunnan and Sichuan. Thus our prizegiving was a way of giving nice attention to the good work being done in Guizhou's two leading cities, Guiyang and Zunyi. The cooperation between the government and the HIV care groups is most sympathetic; and the support of the provincial authorities displayed real concern for the people, and lack of prejudice. We were warmly welcomed by the provincial Vice Governor and Party Secretary Li Jun.

Moreover the prizegiving fitted with the economical spirit of the times. It took place in the offices of the provincial CDC rather than in an hotel. The volunteers, mainly HIV-positive and gay, provided the entertainment; and the dinner, with more than 100 volunteers, was simple but convivial.

The prizewinners in the photo above are Zhang Yan (Pandora), who heads an HIV group in Zunyi, including several children; and Li Meiyang, who leads an enormous group of HIV-positives in Guiyang, 90% gay; and Yuan Fei of the Guiyang City CDC. At left is our new Consul General from Chongqing, Tina Redshaw, who has responsibility for Guizhou. At right are Director General Shen Jie of the Aids Association of China, who came from Beijing for the event, and Gong Yan from the provincial government






## XINJIANG 1 – URUMQI



We have continued to visit Xinjiang every year, and our friendships with the Uighur people, and with the Chinese officials, continue to deepen. There is indeed a great deal of need among the poor people.

In the photo above our friend Mukhtar of the Urumqi CDC is holding his 15 month old daughter Zyra. Mukhtar has for many years been supporting gay Muslim groups around Xinjiang, with our funds. At left of this photo is Zhang Feng of the Health Bureau of the Xinjiang Uighur Autonomous Region, and next to her is Shisong. At right, next to Eugene, is our Director for China, Zhen Li.

In the photo below we visit our old friends at the Xinjiang Infectious Diseases Hospital in Urumqi, which every year adds a new building – and more HIV patients. The new President, Li Ming, is at Martin's left. Between Eugene and Shisong stands Song Yuxia who is now Deputy President of the Hospital and Head of HIV. 
## XINJIANG 2 – YINING CITY, YILI PREFECTURE



Yili Prefecture has the second highest HIV infection in Xinjiang, after Urumqi. The people are Uighur and Kazakh and there are other minorities there. Initially infection has come through drugs, but it is increasingly being passed through sexual routes, and we have an excellent cooperation with the CDC in looking after the gay community. Indeed we were asked to time our visit for a big gay karaoke session on the Saturday night, at which we were expected to be the judges. The Chinese gays sang and the Uighur gays danced. Everybody got prizes. In the photo above are the volunteers at the needle syringe centre in Yining City, which was the subject of one of our prizes some years ago. The photo below left is the activity centre for Uighur women, sponsored partly by Save the Children. We were shown their embroideries and, needless to say, we made a number of purchases. The ladies depend on these purchases. Below right, Eugene purchases pomegranate juice, freshly squeezed with the cruciform machine at the right. The rest of the fruit on the stall is interesting. Xinjiang is famous for its melons, as well as for its grapes, which produce the wines of the Yili Valley and Turfan. The apples of Yili are the original sweet apples of the world. All eating apples, anywhere in the world, descend from the sweet apples of Yili, this beautiful prefecture.



## CHANGCHUN 1



We visited Changchun in the northeastern province of Jilin. It was the birthplace of Martin's mother, Peggy, exactly 100 years before our visit. Our friend Ma Tiecheng, Head of the principal gay group in the north east, in Shenyang, arranged that his annual gathering of the north-eastern gay groups should take place on this occasion in Changchun. He also invited our Trust to co-sponsor the events of the weekend alongside the US Consulate General in Shenyang. And our own Embassy in Beijing showed its support by sending Kathryn Rand to participate. In the photo above we are visiting the hospital in Changchun, to which we made a grant. The photo below shows our Sunday morning seminar, with the US Consul General from Shenyang, Sean Stein, at Martin's right, and Sean's colleagues Pei Tsai and Robert Pastori.
